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Press conference on March 7, in Berlin

Unprecedented public/private partnership for provenance research:
Collaborative search for confiscated works from the Rudolf Mosse
Collection

For the first time since the end of World War II, descendants of victims of Nazi persecution and German public institutions join forces to explore the whereabouts of Nazi-confiscated art

The collection of Berlin publisher, art collector, and philanthropist Rudolf Mosse (1843-1920) consisted of thousands of paintings, sculptures, arts and crafts, books and antiquities. The heirs of the German-Jewish publisher — one of the most influential figures of the Berlin business community during the Weimar Republic — and the Freie Universität will search for the art works expropriated by the National Socialist Party. The Mosse family, publishers of the Berliner Tageblatt, a leading progressive voice, were forced to flee Germany. Participants in the Mosse Art Research Initiative are the Cultural Foundation of the German Federal States, The National Museums in Berlin - Prussian Cultural Heritage Foundation, the Jewish Museum Berlin Foundation, the Berlin State Archives, as well as numerous other German Institutions. MARI is funded by the German Lost Art Foundation in Magdeburg and the Mosse Art Restitution Project.
